GRANT AWARDED FOR SHINGLE HOUSE:

We have been awarded \$25,000 by the Warwick Savings Foundation for the Shingle House Restoration Project. The funding will be applied to the first steps in the project: [1] shore up basement support, [2] eliminate the moisture in the house, and [3] control the environment.

A grant application was submitted to the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation this past June for the Shingle House Restoration Project. Although we will not receive any funding from this effort, this was not unexpected since our project was not one of the funding priorities listed for this year's Historic Preservation Grant Program. However, all effort was not in vain since this submission can be used as a template for a similar submission next spring.

A grant application for \$37,375 was submitted in December to Senator Thomas P. Morahan. This amount, if granted, combined with the Warwick Savings Foundation grant, would cover the estimated cost of the three steps listed above.

Two grant requests to support the Baird Tavern Education Center were also submitted during December. The first went to the Orange County Historian for \$922.29 to cover the cost of supplies necessary for the 2008 educational program. The second grant application was sent to the Provident Bank Charitable Foundation for \$2,600 to hire a teacher for the 2008 programs and to purchase four benches.

Leslie Wood and Sybil Skinner have organized the grant application files. In addition, Sybil has prepared a data base of all our grant applications. This will allow us to coordinate grant applications to avoid multiple submissions to the same source at the same time.

Most of our grant requests are short and not complex. If you might be interested in grant writing, please contact Leslie Wood at 845-987-1705. The Society can use your help, especially now as we embark on the Shingle House Restoration Project.

SERVICE OF REVOLUTIONARY WAR VETERANS BEING UNCOVERED

In December 2006, the Society honored its Revolutionary War veterans with a plaque inscribed with their names which was installed in Warwick Town Hall. Many questions came in about the men, but little information was available at the time. A new resource is now available, and over the past several weeks, the Society's archivist has been combing through Footnote.com's database of federal records, looking for the pension applications of local Revolutionary veterans.

These first person accounts of the men who filed for pensions are yielding a picture of just what local men were up to during the war, in far more detail than was previously available. The service of Azariah Ketchum, builder of our Ketchum House museum, is among them, and a transcription of his recollections has been made and posted on the Warwick History blog (<http://warwickhistory.blogspot.com>).

What is most striking in these records is the desperation of the veterans, who were elderly and near destitute in the early 1800's, and how many of them lacked written proof of their service or sufficient living witnesses to testify—resulting in their pensions being denied. The letters are a poignant reminder that even during the early years of our country the sacrifices of some were overlooked.
